
Putting military sexual violence in context

The 'continuum of violence' (Liz <u>Kelly</u>)

"gender links violence at different points on a scale reaching from the personal to the international, from the home and urban backstreet to the manoeuvres of the tank column and the sortie of the stealth bomber: battering and marital rape, confinement, "dowry" burnings, honour killings, and genital mutilation in peacetime; military rape, sequestration, prostitution, and sexualized torture in war. No wonder women often say, "War? Don't speak to me of war. My daily life is battlefield enough." (Cockburn, 2004: 43).



What is the relevant context?

- In the <u>year ending March 2022</u>, in the UK, approx. 3.3% of women and 1.2% of men over 16 experienced some form of sexual assault.
- Sexual violence in warzones sometimes a weapon of war, sometimes opportunistic, a form of unit bonding or initiation for fighters, torture, within communities and so on.
 - e.g. 'Comfort System' in Asia-Pacific War, Bosnia and Rwanda in the 1990s, the DRC, Darfur, Yazidi women, Ukraine, Israel/Palestine.
 - Also examples involving British personnel, e.g. against detainees at Camp Breadbasket in Iraq.

- High levels of sexual exploitation and abuse around military bases: e.g. the US in Okinawa, UN Peacekeepers in Central African Republic.
- Ongoing investigation against into British Army behaviour in Kenya, centred around the British Army Training Unit Kenya in Nanyuki.
- This includes ongoing investigation into the killing of Agnes Wanjiru in 2012, o including allegations of a cover up.

- High levels of domestic violence in militaries, including the British military.
- Significant potential barriers making it difficult to seek help for DV in the military context.
